Title: To what extent was the Battle of Somme 1916 a British success?

Criterion A: 4 marks

An appropriate question for the investigation has been stated. Two non-contemporary

secondary sources have been chosen for an evaluation and the candidate explained the

relevance of these sources for the investigation. The first source is a history textbook "The

world this century: working with evidence" written by the British author Niel DeMarco

published in 2004 and the second source is a book "The 1916 Battle of the Somme: A

Reappraisal" by the British historian Peter Liddle published in 2001. The value and limitations

of the origin, purpose and content of these sources could have been discussed a bit more in

detail.

Criterion B: 12 marks

There is a logic development (a coherent and effectively organized investigation) that focus

well on the stated question. The investigation presents important arguments and gives detailed

evidence to support these arguments. Many historians have been used to show that each one

of the main arguments is also subject to a discussion – with other words the investigation is

not only aware of the different perspectives but also argues in an analytical way to certain

conclusions based on these perspectives. The improvement would be a more developed

conclusion at the end of the investigation instead of a few different conclusions. Still – this is

a well-organized investigation that I clearly focused on the research question and argues in an

analytical way towards several conclusions.

Criterion C: 3 marks

The candidate shows an awareness of methods used by historians as well as challenges faced

by the professional writers. There is also an explicit connection with these methods and

challenges and the candidates own work.
